

CUCPTSA LEGISLATION/ADVOCACY TEAM April 2018 Report

Trustee Judy Bullockus will be in attendance on Friday, April 13, 2018 for us to get to know her better.

In Local News:

Esencia K-8 in Rancho Mission Viejo is opening with a rolling opening in 2018-2019 with just K-5, adding 6^{th} grade in 2019-2020, 7^{th} grade in 2020-2021, and finally as a comprehensive K-8th in 2021-2022. CUSD held its first ever 6^{th} Grade Round-up at the start of March to determine if there were the students to open initially as a K-6, and unfortunately found fewer students than were predicted in what would be the 6^{th} , 7^{th} , and 8^{th} grades. As students move from grade to grade with this rolling opening, there will be sufficient students to offer a comprehensive program at the middle school.

School Safety is a concern to everyone, especially in light of the recent school shooting in Parklamd, Florida. Mike Beekman presented on the school safety plan. CUSD has lead the Nation in advanced planning and running of drills to ensure the safety of our schools. One safety feature that is in place at our Middle and High Schools is the Text a Tip Hotline specific to each school. I have included the list of all text a tip numbers for you to share with your PTSA's. Encourage your students to save it in their phones, so if they ever need it, they have it already there without needing to go and find a poster somewhere on campus. Mike Beekman has offered to come and hold campus safety talks at any of our PTA/PTSA meetings, just contact him to arrange a day and time. His presentations are very informative on the strategies CUSD have in place to ensure our students safety.

Superintendent Vital has committed to delaying the implementation of the California Healthy Kids Act again as CUSD revisits what curriculum to use. The suggested "Teen Talk" Curriculum, formally approved by the Board of Trustees, has had some community push-back, as well as support. In an effort to gain consensus, Vital again delayed the implementation of the law that went into effect in January 2016 to try and find or develop a curriculum that meets the requirements of the law as well is acceptable to the unique communities with CUSD. As a result a Taskforce is being developed to review multiple curriculums and make recommendations to the Board on this subject. Recommendations

from the taskforce will come at the start of the 2018/2019 school year with implementation intended for the 2018-2019 school year.

CUSD has issued a "Notice of Violation to Oxford Preparatory Academy Pursuant to Education Code 47607 and has requested remedy by May 14, 2018. Trustee Reardon shared that the concerns are with staffing and financial records. OPA is doing well academically and he wants to see the school survive, but that action needs to be taken to rectify the problem. CUSD has worked with OPA since the fall of 2016 to try and rectify this situation before resorting to issuing this Notice of Violation. At the March 28, 2018, Special Board of Trustees Meeting, the Board formally approved the retirement bonus that was tentatively approved in February as part of the CUEA contract agreement. 184 teachers have submitted intent to retire effective June 30, 2018 as part of this package they will receive an annuity valued at 80% of their final year's salary paid out over 5 to 10 years (by the employees choice.)

From Fourth District PTA:

Both the March and April Advocacy Communicators were published since our last meeting, both are attached to this email and both sets of talking points are included in this Report.

Talking Points for Legislative Chairs, April 2018

Details are in the April issue of the Advocacy Communicator.

- PTA has lost a beloved friend, Ron Bennett, who died on March 17. He was the CEO
 of School Services of California and spoke at many PTA advocacy events, most
 recently at Sacramento Safari in February.
- State lawmakers are considering a bill that would require middle and high schools to begin classes no earlier than 8:30 a.m. Zero period would still be allowed. Senator Anthony Portantino, the author of the bill, says that school districts that have changed to later start times have seen numerous positive results, including higher academic achievement, fewer discipline problems, fewer car accidents involving teens, and less smoking, sexual promiscuity, criminal activity and suicide. California State PTA supports this bill.
- California is bringing in about \$3 billion more than expected in tax revenues. The
 governor wants to give school districts \$1.8 billion on a one-time basis to use as
 they wish. Some of the state lawmakers would rather add \$1 billion to the Local
 Control Funding Formula base amount, which would increase school funding on an
 ongoing basis. State PTA supports AB 2808, which would increase LCFF base
 amounts.
- Did you know teenagers can pre-register to vote when they are 16 or 17? Then they are automatically registered when they turn 18. They can register at the California Secretary of State website or at the Orange County Registrar of Voters website.
- We're in the second year of a two-year state legislative cycle and PTA is supporting a number of proposed laws. These include bills dealing the Career Technical Education, sex education classes, a literacy program for low-income children, preschool and kindergarten programs, and English language learners.
- Five candidates are running for state superintendent of public instruction to replace Tom Torlakson, who will be termed out this year.
- The next California State PTA advocacy conference call is at 7 p.m. on Monday, April 23.

Talking Points for Legislative Chairs, March 2018

Details are in the March issue of the Advocacy Communicator.

- Sixty-four parents and one high school student participated in this year's Sacramento Safari. They had two main requests for the legislators.
 - Amend the Local Control and Accountability Plan to include Family Engagement. The current law has a key area on parent involvement, but it is not well-defined. PTA wants more specific language.
 - Hold legislative hearings to explore ways to increase school funding.
 California is still at or near the bottom nationwide both in per pupil funding

and in academic achievement. PTA would like to bring the state up to the level of the top ten states in funding and achievement.

- A new research study has found that the additional funding from the Local Control Funding Formula does have a positive impact on the academic achievement of students.
- California State PTA supports an initiative that would require commercial and industrial properties to pay more property taxes. There would be no change in Prop. 13 protections for homeowners and agricultural property.

In a new study entitled <u>Money and Freedom: The Impact of California's School Finance Reform</u>, researchers Rucker C. Johnson, Associate Professor of Public Policy at the University of California, Berkeley's Goldman School of Public Policy, and Learning Policy Institute Senior Researcher Sean Tanner found that increases in district revenue brought about through California's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) has had a "strongly significant" impact on average high school graduation rates for all students in the state. California State PTA Sponsors AB 2878 to Strengthen Family Engagement in Schools Family engagement is a key predictor of student success. That's why California State PTA is sponsoring <u>Assembly Bill 2878</u> by Assemblymember Rocky Chávez (San Diego). Research shows authentic family engagement leads to reduced absenteeism, decreased dropout rates, increased student achievement and increased graduation rates which lead to young adults who are college and career ready.

This bill demonstrates a commitment to connecting families, schools and communities and to improving student outcomes. AB 2878 seeks to use research-based guidelines to define what authentic family engagement could look like in the Education Code to help guide schools. The suggested activities have been developed using research-based family engagement practices and standards, including, but not limited to, the PTA National Standards for Family-School Partnerships. It could also include:



Outreach in multiple languages

Outreach to parents and families that are underrepresented in the school, school district or county office of education

Outreach strategies that are diverse and innovative.

Adding Family Engagement to LCFF Priority #3 would better reflect the true engagement local education agencies could implement, based on their local needs. It's time to engage all parents and families for the success of our

students, our schools and our state.



California State PTA Co-Sponsors Assembly Bill 1871

California State PTA is proud to support and co-sponsor <u>AB 1871</u> (Bonta). This will require charter schools to provide each needy pupil with one nutritionally adequate free or reduced-price meal during each school day. Low-income charter school students are the only low-income public school students not protected under the existing state law that makes school meals available to students in need. California State PTA has a long

California State PTA supports the California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act of 2018

This initiative will change how commercial and industrial property is taxed and raise between \$6 billion and \$10 billion to support our schools (40 percent) and other local governments (60 percent). President Dianna MacDonald issued the following statement: "California State PTA strongly supports the California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act. Our schools have been desperately underfunded for years, and we need this measure to ensure our children have the resources they need in order to learn."

"PTA believes it is necessary to close corporate loopholes that are starving our schools of much needed funding, so that our schools have resources to give our young people a world-class education. We urge parents across the state to support this act to give classrooms - and our children - the funding they need."

Suicide Awareness and Prevention Advocacy

Nationwide, suicide has become the second leading cause of deaths among youth ages 15 - 19. In California, suicide varies between the second and third leading cause of death in teens. These deaths are tragic and unfortunately not rare. Their families, friends, classmates and the community are all impacted. Part of the tragedy is that death by suicide can be preventable.

California State PTA has been working to prevent suicide in California's children and youth for years. In the current legislative session, we are supporting or evaluating bills that will help students get the help they need in crisis situations. <u>AB 2390</u> (Harper) and <u>SB 972</u> (Portantino) will put the suicide prevention hotline phone number on the back of student ID cards. This will give students in middle and high school a way to ask for help, for themselves or a peer, on a card they carry with them day to day.

<u>AB 2639</u> (Berman) will make an evidence-based online suicide prevention training program available to students and all school personnel. The training includes recognizing signs that a student is at risk and learning how to offer help.

Legislative Action Committee Report - February and March 2018

This legislative session, California State PTA took positions on 18 bills in the California Legislature. View California State PTA's <u>February</u> and <u>March</u> Legislative Action Committee Reports.

I am including in the email both the February and March reports for your perusal. They provide insight into the bills in the State Assembly and Senate that CAPTA has taken a position on. At the moment there are 18 pieces of legislation they are following, mostly with support positions, though some with support if amended.

Highlights from the Current Session

Supported by California State PTA:

AB 1861 (Rodriguez): The California Healthy Youth Act requires school districts to ensure that all pupils in grades 7 to 12 receive comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education. This instruction also includes, among other things, information about human trafficking. This bill would require the information about human



trafficking to also include information on how social media and mobile device applications are used for human trafficking. <u>Learn more here</u>

AB 2265 (Obernolte): This bill would establish a State Seal of STEM to recognize high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in science, technology, engineering and mathematics fields. The bill would also establish criteria for the receipt of the State Seal of STEM, would require the Superintendent of Public Instruction to prepare and deliver to participating school districts the insignia to be attached to diplomas or transcripts and would require participating school districts to maintain appropriate records and attach the insignia to diplomas or transcripts of recipient pupils. SB 183 (Lara): This bill would prohibit federal immigration enforcement agents, officers or personnel from entering a building owned and occupied (or leased and occupied) by the state, a public school or a campus of the California Community Colleges to perform surveillance, effectuate an arrest or question an individual in the building without a valid federal warrant. It would also limit the activities of federal immigration enforcement agents, officers or personnel to the individual who is the subject of the warrant. Learn more here.

At the National Level:

Reporting school-level expenses under Every Student Succeeds Act

The Education Commission of the States has published a two-page guide for a new, potentially contentious requirement in ESSA. Starting in 2018-19, states must report federal, state and local expenditures at the school level using actual teacher salaries in each school. The California State Board of Education has not yet decided how this should be done. The report notes that the Trump administration rescinded guidelines that would have provided some clarity. The House voted to increase the Department of Education budget by \$3.9 Billion despite Secretary of Education attempting to cut the budget by over \$9 billion (13%) The spending bill then moved to the Senate. With all the discussion regarding needed changes in gun laws within our country, I wanted to remind everyone of the National PTA's Position Statement on Firearms (you can find this online at https://www.pta.org/docs/default-source/files/advocacy/position-statements/firearms-ps.pdf):

FIREARMS

Given the history and tradition of strong support for the safety and protection of children and youth, the National PTA supports federal restrictions on firearms that would:

[require, prior to purchasing a firearm, a waiting period and background check to screen out illegal firearm purchasers such as convicted felons and drug-related offenders;

[outlaw military-style semi-automatic assault weapons; and
[require knowledge of appropriate firearms use and safety practices.

Military-style semi-automatic assault weapons would include those firearms which:

[were originally designed for military or law enforcement purposes; and for fully automatic purposes;

Dare designed to be fired in full or semi-automatic mode in combat; Dare designed to accommodate a large capacity combat magazine.

These weapons include:

INTRATEC TEC-9, Street Sweeper and Striker 12, Colt AR-15 and CAR-15, MAC 10 and MAC 11 in addition to five firearms that are in the government's ban, including Norinco, Mitchell, and Poly Technologies Automat Kalashnikov S (all models), Action Arms Israeli

Military Industries UZI and Galil, Fabrique Nationale FN/FAL; FN/LAR, and FNC, Steyr AUG.
